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Public confidence in local government depends on clear and timely disclosure of relationships that intersect with city decision-making. Disclosure allows citizens to evaluate whether decisions are made impartially, whether appropriate safeguards are in place, and whether public interests, not private relationships, are guiding outcomes.

Oklahoma law and widely accepted municipal governance standards emphasize transparency, disclosure, and avoidance of conflicts or the appearance of conflicts in public business.¹² These principles are especially important when decisions involve public revenue, contracts, annexation, or regulatory authority, where undisclosed relationships can undermine trust even if actions are otherwise lawful.

In Muskogee, questions arose during public debate over annexation and tourism governance about whether certain personal and professional relationships were fully disclosed at the time decisions were being discussed. These included employment and professional connections involving individuals who were actively advocating positions before City Council or participating in city-adjacent authorities.³⁴ When such relationships become known only after the fact, citizens are left to question whether the public had full context while decisions were being made.

The concern is not that relationships exist; relationships are inevitable in a community. The concern is whether those relationships were disclosed clearly and early enough to allow for transparency, recusal where appropriate, and informed public oversight. Without disclosure, even well-intentioned decisions can lose credibility, expose the City to legal or ethical challenges, and erode public confidence.

Disclosure protects everyone involved. It safeguards public officials, preserves institutional trust, and ensures the City can demonstrate that decisions were made openly and fairly. During periods of leadership transition, when scrutiny is heightened and responsibilities shift, proactive disclosure is essential to maintaining confidence in local government.

This briefing explains why disclosure of relationships affecting city business is a foundational requirement of ethical governance and why citizens are right to expect full transparency when public trust and public resources are at stake.
